The Bibles teaches us that that universal cause is sin. "The



After the conference everyone went back to Ebenezer Hall where Archie gave a short Gospel Message and at the end of this, I spoke to him, asking him what I had to do to get saved. He gave me a little booklet, written by himself, called, "Things the Young Believer Should Know" and encouraged me to read it. I read it in bed that night and after realising that I was a sinner and that the Lord Jesus had died for my sins, I asked the Lord Jesus to come into my heart and to forgive me. On the 15th of February 2013, I then followed the Lord's commandment by being baptised by immersion which also took place in Ebenezer Hall, Dreghorn. A few years after this, as a family, we stopped attending the meetings of the church and I found myself, as a senior in high school, facing peer pressure that I found difficult to cope with and sadly, in this period of my life, I wasn't very good at living the Christian life. I followed the crowd and the only Christian influence I had was from the friends that I had made at the Ayrshire Youth Camps that I had previously attended and enjoyed. Every so often I would also attend the church in Kilmarnock where my grandparents were members. ### **AIRDS MOSS**

The Battle of Airds Moss took place on the 22nd July 1680. Government troops, led by Bruce of Earlshall, came across a group of covenanters led by Richard Cameron. The battle was brief, nine covenanters, including Cameron, were killed, five were captured and the rest escaped. The battle is commemorated by a memorial in the shape of a small obelisk which can be seen off to the left on the Cumnock/Muirkirk Road.



Cameron was passionate about Christ and the Gospel.

Please ponder the following words which he preached one day standing out on the moor:-

"It's sad to think upon the West of Scotland, the wild Highlands have not neglected as many invitations as you have done. Maybe you think you have enough, and therefore you have no need of the Gospel. Yet, you are the people in all Scotland who are in the worst condition. What do you say, shall I go and tell my Master that you will not come unto Him? These hills and mountains around us testify that I have offered Him to you this day. Angels are wondering at the offer. They stand beholding with admiration that our Lord is giving you such an offer this day. Nay, those that have gone to hell many years ago, and who are now crying out in the agonies of torment, may be saying, "0, that we had such an offer as yonder parish of Auchinleck!""

Powerful words spoken out of a heart of genuine love for the souls of men. Having preached Cameron, and many present, stood and wept for the souls of men.

His message was based on the words of the Lord Jesus, "You will not come to me, that you might have life." (John 5.40) On another occasion the Lord said, "I am come that they might have life, and that they might have it more abundantly." (John 10.10). Christ was, and still is, offering LIFE – eternal, abundant, spiritual life. Who wants life? Surely someone who is dead? In Ephesians 2.1 we learn that we are all "dead in trespasses and sins" – physically alive but separated from God and thus spiritually dead. Existing, but not really living as God intends us to

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**live**. Even if man is, by and large, unconcerned with this situation, God is, and has done something about it. God sent His Son, the Lord Jesus Christ, into the world to reconcile us to Himself. He came to deal with the sin that caused the problem. He did that when He died for our sins on the cross and subsequently rose from the dead. Through Christ, and indeed in Christ, **God now offers life to all who will receive it by faith**. The Bible says, "For the wages of sin is death; but the gift of God is eternal life in Jesus Christ our Lord." (Romans 6.23)

When an invitation, or an offer is made, the one who receives it must make a choice – receive it or reject it!! Cameron's grief over the people of the West of Scotland in his day was similar to the grief of the Lord Jesus over His generation – "you will not come and receive the life which is on offer". Cameron reminds us – "angels wonder at this gift" and "lost souls in hell long for it" and maybe you, like many others, are treating it with contempt. Is the Lord Jesus sadly speaking these words over you today, "You will not come that you might have life"? How tragic – refusing a gift that is incomparable with anything that has ever been offered – a gift that is for our enjoyment now and for eternity. A costly and precious gift that was purchased by the sacrificial death of the Lord Jesus on the cross. He laid down His physical life that we might have eternal life.

On the morning of his death on Airds Moss, Cameron, as he washed his hands and face, said, "This is their last washing; I have need to make them clean, for there are many to see them." His head and hands were subsequently severed from his body and taken to Edinburgh where Bruce claimed his reward for the killing. How like his Saviour who was put on public display – a hostile mob gazed at His hands (nailed to a cross) and His head (crowned with thorns) after He had been betrayed for the reward of thirty pieces of silver – the ultimate rejection – He offered them life and they put Him to death. We read the words of Scripture, "How shall we escape, if we neglect so great salvation; which at the first began to be spoken by the Lord, and was confirmed unto us by them that heard

him."(Hebrews 2.3) The reality is there is no escape. The offer of eternal life is made in time and, if refused, will be regretted for eternity. In the words of Richard Cameron, "those that have gone to hell many years ago, and who are now crying out in the agonies of torment, may be saying, "0, that we had such an offer as yonder parish of Auchinleck!!"









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
