

# MEET A MEMBER STEVE REID

I was born in Bishopbriggs in 1959. My family immigrated to Canada in 1969. My family never had an active interest in church. God wasn't discussed or mentioned in the house except as a swear word.

# I started drinking in the last couple of years of high school. After a couple of years working as



After completely screwing up in Canada, I returned to **Scotland determined**, **once again**, **to make a fresh start**. My determination didn't last the flight over. After working some Glasgow bars and moving for a while to the Midlands, I found myself back in Glasgow – **homeless**. However, family in Ayrshire heard about my situation and got me a place to stay in Ochiltree. However, I continued drinking myself to death. While staying in a local bedsit I met Rosie, the mother of another tenant, who took me to my first Gospel Meeting and over the next couple of years, as I moved around East Ayrshire, the Christians from the Gospel Hall in Auchinleck kept in touch. After being homeless again, **the council put me in a house on Stoner Crescent**.

Life was all about where the next drink was coming from. However, I kept dropping in at the Gospel Hall and people would also take me to house meetings at Rosie's in Ochiltree. Despite not having any background in the church, **the existence of God was something I believed in**. My problem was I felt I had to clean myself up to be acceptable to Him, which is impossible for man, only possible with God. I ended up before the Sheriff in Ayr for drunk



driving. Despite it being my first offence, and there being no accident or other parties involved, I was banned for 99 years with a minimum 5 years, as no one expected me to live another 5 years. Social work report said that I lived to drink. I always had a bottle to hand, even sleeping with one beside me. I would wake up, drink and go back to sleep.

Attempting to sober up for the court, I had only succeeded in putting myself into alcohol withdrawal and severe DT's. My brother in Christ, Ian Robertson, had driven me to court. After sentencing, he took me home and as I got out of the car, expecting me to hit the bottle, he said "just go easy". I sat in the house thinking about what had happened and before I started drinking the Lord spoke to my heart and asked, "Have you had enough?". Having reached the end of myself, I said "Yes Lord, forgive me". Immediately my DT's were gone, the relentless desire for alcohol was gone, the person looking back from the mirror was different. "Old things are passed away; behold all things are made new." 2 Corinthians 5.17

Twenty years later and the Lord has never left me. From homeless to homeowner, unemployed to business owner, alone to loved and married all because I trusted the One who did for me what I could never do for myself. The One from whom I had no right to expect anything, gave me everything laying down His life for me on a cross at Calvary.

# **COMMUNITY CONNECTIONS**

## **JAMES BOSWELL**

Whether we wander round the streets of Auchinleck, walk up Kirk Brae past the Parish Church, enjoy coffee and cake in the Coach House, have a drink in a particular village pub, or simply remember the primary school house and colour to which you were assigned for Sports' day, the name Boswell is closely associated with the village. Approaching by road, the signs indicate that Auchinleck is in fact, the home of James Boswell, and not as some might prefer the signs to say, the home of the mighty all-conquering Talbot. Only last month some of the great and the



good from the world of literature descended on Dumfries House to celebrate the life and work of **one of Auchinleck's most famous sons, James Boswell**.

Why does this 18th century, 9th Laird of Auchinleck, still maintain so much influence and be celebrated today? It was as a diarist and biographer that **James Boswell gained such prominence among his literary peers** and remains a figure hugely remembered and honoured by the festivals, documentaries, scholarly articles, not to mention streets, pubs, cafes and school sports' houses today. It was his ability to record the actions and deeds of others in print that led to his acclaim. This, some might argue, makes James Boswell's works not the thing to be admired, but rather their subject. It's a bit like the moon. It's beauty, and our appreciation of it, only comes from the fact that it is able to reflect the light that comes from the Sun. **The moon has no light of its' own**. The Sun, in Boswell's case, was Dr Samuel Johnson, the English writer, his greatest work being **Johnson's**, "A Dictionary of the English Language".

Johnson's dictionary had a far-reaching effect on Modern English. It brought him popularity and success. Until the completion of the Oxford English Dictionary 150 years later, Johnson's dictionary had no peer. By the end of the eighteenth century every educated household had, or had access, to the great book. So firmly established did it swiftly become that any request for "The Dictionary" would bring forth Johnson's and none other. One commentator wrote, 'One asked for The Dictionary, much as one might demand The Bible.'


This comparison brings us to consider other biographers who preceded Boswell by centuries. They too had a subject, a person, however, of far greater note than Dr Samuel Johnson. **The four Gospels**, at the beginning of the New Testament in the Bible, bring before us four different, but matching accounts of the life of Jesus Christ. Samuel Johnson is remembered for his great collection and explanation of English words. The accounts, of Matthew, Mark, Luke and John bring before us the revelation of God to man through **The Word** – "In the beginning was the Word and the Word was with God and the Word was God...And the Word became flesh and dwelt among us, and we beheld his glory, the glory as of the only begotten of the Father, full of grace and truth." John 1:1 & 14

Jesus Christ was God on Earth. He brought a **direct revelation of the heart of God to men and women**. This has been recorded for us by these Gospel biographers. While Johnson certainly brought the truth of the English language to the masses in 18th Century Britain, it could not be said of him that he brought much grace. His moods and mannerisms left a lot to be desired. On the contrary, Christ brought both the truth of God, the giving of His life upon the cross for a sinful world, and the grace of God, the love and healing of a sinless perfect man to those he encountered.

Eventually, Johnson's great literary work was superseded by the Oxford English Dictionary. Language evolves and new words are created to be added to the most up to date Lexicon. "Selfie" was not a concept nor even a word in Johnson's day. However, the message of the Gospels, remain unchanged and ever relevant to a world where uncertainty and insecurity abound. The message is simple yet powerful – "...Christ Jesus came in to the world to save sinners..." 1 Timothy 1:15. The Gospels bring us to Jesus, teaching us about His love for each one of us, regardless of our actions and attitudes towards God. James Boswell

was a talented biographer who captured the essence of his subject, Dr Johnson. The Gospel writers were used to bring to us **the message of salvation through Jesus Christ**.

Samuel Johnson is buried in Westminster Abbey. James Boswell, buried in a crypt, under the Boswell Museum. Jesus Christ was buried in a borrowed tomb. The remains of the first two lie in the same places where they were laid. However, on the third day, Jesus Christ rose again. He lives today and shines brighter than the Sun. His desire? That His light might fall upon each one of us and that we might reflect just some of His magnificent glory to the world around.
